Objectives

- o To experience the complete process of creating music beginning with imagination and ending up in live performance.
- o To develop composition skills.
- o To create new pieces of music.
- To model the creative process as a fundamental human activity and need. The ability to use one's imagination to create solutions to problems is ultimately the most important skill in any field of endeavor.

Composition Assignments

These assignments are the most important activities of the class. They will be graded on:

Score Quality (Neatness/Accuracy) 40%
Performance Quality (Rehearsal) 20%
Assignment Constraints 40%

Even though some assignments may be performed by you or a friend, scores should be clear enough so that anyone who is interested could use your score and create a performance that credibly adheres to your wishes without you being present. Often very clear verbal instructions can make a score much easier to understand, even if it uses conventional notation. Remember also that your performance is just as important as the composition, since, in the world of the composer-performer, the two are inseparable.

Listening Assignments

These assignments will occur weekly, and are to be handed in every Monday. Choose enough pieces from the "Mappings" Radio Show to equal 30 or more minutes of listening. Type a reaction to what you hear, not to exceed one page in standard format. Reactions written about more than 45 minutes of listening will be considered for extra credit.

Participation

Attendance is extremely important because of the workshop atmosphere of the class and the amount of performance we will be doing in class. In such a small class, your classmates depend on you to be present. You are expected to attend all class periods and expected to participate actively in class activities, including discussions and performing other student's assignments. You will be allowed three absences with no effect on your grade. On your fourth absence your overall grade will be lowered one full letter grade. Subsequently on the seventh and tenth absences your grade will also be lowered. Missing class on a day when you are scheduled to perform will count as two absences! Also remember that attendance at the weekly composition forums on Tuesdays is also part of this grade.

Major Project and Concert

The class is presenting a concert of its own, featuring performances your major projects on Tuesday, April 2, 8:00pm in Pitman Recital Hall. The class will be responsible for putting the recital together.

Portfolio

You will hand in a copy of your portfolio at the end of the semester and it will serve as your final project/exam. It should be a presentable and, hopefully, beautiful collection of the compositions that you have composed and performed during the semester. It should be bound in some way. Three ring binders and plastic sleeves are very practical since items can be added or removed. I will give extra credit for unusual, interesting, or beautiful binding and you may enlist the aid of a friend in the design of this portfolio.
